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## EMPLOYMENT

**October 1999-Present *President, KTA Preservation Specialist.***

KTA specializes in historic fabric reports, cultural resource reports, grant writing, feasibility studies for the adaptive re-use of historic buildings, restoration, and national register nominations. Currently, KTA's most recent projects include the exterior restoration of a Freight House in Syracuse's Inner Harbor, a 1917 structure, which was part of the Erie Barge Canal System, and the design of a new 'Harbor Master' building on the same site. The new structure had to comply with the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for new construction within an historic site. Currently KTA is consulting with Trinity Episcopal Church in Buffalo, NY in their restoration process (masonry and rose window) and with Archaeological Survey, SUNY, Buffalo, NY.

**August 1998-Present *Clinical Associate Professor, State University of New York, at Buffalo.***

Part of a five-member team teaching design to 100 sophomore architecture students. Focus is on the study, and application of design principles. Other teaching responsibilities include graduate electives in Historic Preservation, and American Architectural History.

**January 2002 – Present *Lecturer, Erie Community College, City Campus***

Part-time faculty in the Building Maintenance and Management Program. Taught a semester of Print Reading, Spring, 2002 and a Restoration Practicum using Shea's Theatre, in Buffalo, NY as a laboratory for practical training in various restoration techniques, Fall 2002 - Present.

**January 1999-May 2000 *Clinical Associate Professor, Architectural History, State University of New York, at Buffalo.***

Taught two survey courses: "Ancient Through the Industrial Revolution", and "Modern Architecture" which are required for students in the undergraduate, and graduate program. These courses are intended to introduce students to selected buildings, and sites in the history of architecture, defining their stylistic, and formal characteristics in light of developments in technology, the history of ideas, and social and historical factors. In the

process the student should gain a better understanding of architecture, and the role of history in contemporary practice.

**July 1996-September 1999 *Preservation Specialist, Foit-Albert Associates, Architects, Engineers & Surveyors P.C.***

Responsibilities included preparation of historic condition reports, grants, and feasibility studies for the adaptive re-use of historic buildings; overseeing adaptive re-use, and rehabilitation projects to ensure compliance with the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation; involvement in conceptual design, design development, and construction drawing phases of adaptive re-use projects, and projects involving new construction.

**November 1994-December 1995 *Restoration Project Manager, Kentucky Heritage Council, State Historic Preservation Office.***

Responsibilities included overseeing investment tax credit projects, and grants provided for the rehabilitation of historic buildings throughout the Commonwealth of Kentucky. This entailed working closely with the project architect, and reviewing architectural documents to ensure compliance with the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation. Examination of historic structures, privately and publicly owned, throughout Kentucky, was carried out to determine the integrity of the building, and possibilities for rehabilitation. Member of resource teams that visited various towns, and historic sites in Kentucky to determine feasibility for potential rehabilitation. This involved the production of action plan reports. Worked with the Kentucky Main Street Program, providing technical, and design assistance. Conducted design workshops, and provided board training to Main Street Coordinators. Organized a design competition for the Kentucky Civil War Museum.

**August 1993-August 1994 *Assistant Professor, Department of Landscape Architecture, Mississippi State University.***

Teaching responsibilities included an introductory design studio, Design I, and Design II studios, graphic communications, and a landscape architectural history course. Taught one semester of "Site Design" in the School of Architecture. Other responsibilities included preparation of graphic material for the annual "Council of Educators in Landscape Architecture" conference hosted in the Fall, 1994 by Mississippi State University. This material included mail-out graphics, audio/visual promotional material, and the conference poster.

Taught four semesters of graphic communications, and one semester of Landscape Architectural History.
